

WATCH OUT FOR PAPERCUT


Welcome to "Mickey's Inferno," one of two HALLOWEEN COMICFEST mini-comics from Papercutz, those wonderful folks dedicated to publishing great graphic novels for all ages. The other mini-comic from Papercutz features LUNCH WITCH "Knee-deep in Niceness," by Deb Lucke and should be available at the friendly comics shop nearest you. But back to "Mickey's Inferno," which is a truly special comics story, which we're proud to preview in this special HALLOWEEN COMICFEST mini-comic.

The full story will be presented in the upcoming DISNEY GRAPHIC NOVEL aptly named GREAT PARODIES "Mickey's Inferno" from Papercutz. But to fully understand the importance of this story, we'll need a brief history lesson. (Don't worry, I said "brief"!)

While Mickey Mouse was born in the USA, created in 1928 by Walt Disney and Ub Iwerks, he soon became an international sensation, and besides appearing in countless comicbooks in America, he's also appeared in all-new original comics created in other countries for decades. One of those countries is Italy, which has been publishing Topolino (the Italian name for Mickey Mouse), in various forms since 1932. The post World War II version of Topolino, begun in 1949, featured in its seventh through twelfth issues an all-new series called "Great Parodies." The idea was to create comics, featuring the Disney cartoon stars of the day, spoofing great works of literature.

The very first Great Parody was based on the epic poem *Divine Comedy* by Durante degli Alighieri, better known as Dante (c. 1265 – 1321), which is considered by many to be the greatest literary work ever composed in the Italian language, and a masterpiece of world

literature. The poem describes Dante's journey through Hell (Inferno), Purgatory (Purgatorio), and Paradise (Paradiso), guided by the Roman poet Virgil, and then by his true-love, Beatrice, The comic was written by Guido Martina and drawn by Angelo Bioletto. An abridged English version of "Mickey's Inferno" appeared in WALT DISNEY'S COMICS AND STORIES #666 (Of course!), translated and adapted by Dwight Decker and David Gerstein, Papercutz is proud to present the full, unabridged comic in GREAT PARODIES, with an all-new script by Stefan Petrucha. Like the epic poem itself, and previous adaptations, this version also features captions that are in interza rima. Dante's rhyme scheme for his Divine Comedy. Also like the original poem, the story is presented in cantos, which is how long poems are usually divided.

So, in other words, what we have here is a classic comic inspired by one of the greatest literary works of all time! But the coolest thing about it...? It stars Mickey Mouse as Dante, Goofy as Virgil, Minnie Mouse as Beatrice, and such other classic Disney stars as Dumbo, Dopey, Jiminy Cricket, and others in awesome cameo roles. What better way to celebrate Halloween than join Mickey and Goofy their journey though... well, you know where! We hope you enjoy this special preview and ask your comics shop to reserve a copy of the full DISNEY GRAPHIC NOVEL, GREAT PARODIES "Mickey's Inferno" for you. After all, how can you not want to see how (and where) Mickey finally ends up?



















Thinking jaws and claws were hot on my heels With heart, mind and Peet, I raced along When salvation appeared with a bell and two wheels.

"Beatrice asked I guide you through this place."




It's me, Virgii, who well knows his way around here! We can't both ride the bike, so you'll have ta walk, And what lays ahead Pills the bravest with Pear!

From just round the bend came some terrible cries, Not of pain, nor of joy or of rage, More like a great beast using his roar to advertise.



































They balled up their schoolwork in spherical blobs, Patiently, with all the time in the world, Since their poor education left them each without jobs!

Not one could draw a drop, from what I could tell. Their baskets were too full of holes. Yet they still tried, as if under a spell.






Now held a machine gun in his eager hands!
